
Go-Kart Racing and Picnic at Hot Laps Karting Center





JANE's LeMons Car A Truly Uplifting Experience By Tom Moses



he 24 Hours of LeMons race is fast approaching. Scheduled for August Gordon made the arrangements with Wagner Motors for complimentary 23rd and 24th, at Stafford Springs, CT, the LeMons race is for cars purchased, fixed up, and track-prepped for a total of \$500 or less.

Stafford Motor Speedway is located at the intersection of Route 140 and West Street in Stafford Springs, CT. Stafford Springs is about a half hour north of Hartford, CT, 80 minutes west of Providence, RI, and 90 minutes southwest of Boston, MA.

A Truly Uplifting Experience

At the last gathering, the LeMons team raised the XJ40 LeMons car, using Jim Coull's lift. Aldo Cipriano, Dennis Eklof, Buzz Hawes, Tom Letourneau, and Tom Moses met at Jim's house. The plan was to remove the catalytic converter, which had been sold to buy the team a new set of heavy-duty XJ12 shocks, while keeping the value of the car below \$500. With the converter removed, a simple straight pipe would complete the

But, with the car in the air, the team discovered not one, but two catalytic converters intertwined in a Siamese configuration. This discovery was good news for converter sales, but made inserting a single straight pipe impossible. With the Y-pipe ahead of dual converters, a fabricated Y connecting two straight pipes would be required. Fortunately, there was Plan B.

There is Always Plan B

With the 4,500-lb XJ40 sedan floating in mid-air, measurements were taken so that a simple section of bent pipe with a single muffler could exit the underside of the car just ahead of the rear wheel.

With Plan B in effect, Tom Letourneau set out to get the bent pipe and muffler, and the LeMons car was loaded onto the trailer and delivered to Wagner Motors in Boylston, MA

Armand, the Service Manager at Wagner Motors, was all smiles as the LeMons car arrived and was driven off the trailer. JANE's own Steve

oil change and lube, shock install and fuel-fault-14 resolution.

On time and on budget. Costs associated with the event have been covered by donations. Money for the caritself, including the parts, has been raised by selling un-needed spares. Work on the car has been completed by JANE members or at no charge. And on race day, each driver pays his own driver fee, as do pit workers and non-driver team members. At the June meeting, the JANE Board of Directors voted to approve a motion to pay the 24 Hours of LeMons registration fee for the JANE team.

Drivers Wanted

Six Drivers are needed. The committed drivers at this point are Ed Hall, Alan Quinn, Tom Moses, and Dean Cusano. But two more are needed. Contact Tom Moses before he contacts you. While this is a wheel-to-wheel racetrackevent, drivers include total non-racers, amateur racers, and pros. Stafford Springs honors competition licenses from SCCA, FIA, NASA, NASCAR, CSRG, USAC, HMSA, HSR, SVRA, and others.

Drivers without competition licenses are eligible with a supplemental competition waiver at the track on the morning of the race; these cost \$50 and are good for one calendar year at any LeMons race.

Drivers are required to have an undamaged Type SA helmet, Snell 95 or better, and fire-retardant clothing. Full SFI- or FIA-approved fireretardant driving suits must be worn by all drivers at all times while inside the car. IF USING A SINGLE-LAYER 3.2/A1 or 3.2/A3 SUIT, DRIVER MUST ALSO WEAR FIRE-RETARDANT LONG JOHNS. Multi-layer suits rated 3.2/A5 or higher are highly recommended, and may be worn without long johns. Fire-retardant FIA or SFI-rated racing gloves and shoes are required.



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




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Event Reports

Brigadoon #6

Although not an official JANE activity, Brigadoon may be of interest to JANE members who own the venerable XK Jaguars. No, not the modern XK's, the old ones . . . the ones you know as XK120, XK140, and XK150. Brigadoon is made up of a group of XK owners from the XK-Lovers list who get together somewhere in the Northeast U.S. every May or June. At the most recent gathering there were eight XK's, plus a scattering of other Jaguars (Mk 9, XK8, S-Type), along with some modern, comfortable cars (Volvo, Jeep) at the host's beautiful home on White Meadow Lake in Rockaway, NJ. Generally the attendance at Brigadoon comes from a contingent of several cars from New England (Massachusetts, Vermont, and Connecticut) and a group from New Jersey. Over the years these folks have developed a camaraderie focused on one thing . . . the love and interest in the XK Jaguar.

How did the convention get started? Six years ago, there was a challenge issued by John Morgan, a resident of Martha's Vineyard (called "The Vineyarder"), to Klaus Nielsen of Connecticut (called "The Viking"), to come to the Vineyard with his XK to settle a minor dispute that came up on the XK-Lovers list. Klaus and a bunch of his friends from Massachusetts and New Jersey took up the challenge, arrived on the ferry with their Jaguars, and met up with Mr. Morgan and his classic XK120 OTS for a memorable weekend on the island. The gathering vowed to regroup the following year. On the way back home on the ferry, Klaus observed Martha's Vineyard receding in the mist, just like in the musical "Brigadoon." Hence the name of the gathering became Brigadoon. John Morgan passed away after the second gathering, and the tradition has continued in his honor with annual meetings in Connecticut, Massachusetts, and New Jersey.

This year, Brigadoon #6 was held on the hottest weekend of the year... with temperatures pushing 100 degrees in New Jersey. The Massachusetts group, JANE members John Brady, Tom Brady and Terry Gassner, Carl Hanson, and Steve and Holly Fairchild, ventured down the 200 miles in unfavorable conditions for their old Jaguars. (Those old XK's are not pleased to run in hot weather!) Vermonters Bruce and Donna Cunningham made the trip in the cool comfort of their Volvo. But arriving to a warm (!) reception in NJ with all their old friends, the travails of the travel were forgotten amid the food and beverages, road rallies, and tech sessions associated with the Brigadoon group. We were greeted by Ed Hyman, the event organizer, as we arrived at the Inn. There were some reserved parking places in front of the Inn for tour participants. Many of us gathered on the porch for drinks. We had an informal dinner in the courtyard on Friday evening.

The "Weather Goddess," Cindy Webber, performed her magic on Saturday with a beautiful sunny and not too hot day. Cindy and her husband, Bob, who help run the tour, own an XK120 DHC. We lined up to start the tour and had an eclectic group of cars, ranging from a Subaru wagon to a 1927 Bentley 4½ Liter open tourer. 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Road Rallies -- Join the Adventure!

hat is a Road Rally? Unlike some disciplines of the SCCA, COM, and other marque clubs that run events based upon lowest elapsed time and speed (e.g., Racing, Solo, RallyCross), Road Rallying, which usually takes place over country back roads, is a driving competition based upon following a precise course. In other words, a Road Rally is a scenic drive through the countryside with a little friendly competition thrown in.

A Road Rally travels over public roads, and while competitors are expected to obey all traffic laws, they also get to take in the beauty of these $wonderful, beautiful, country\,back\,roads\,that\,they\,otherwise\,might\,never\\ \ are\,always\,done\,with\,straightforward\,instructions\,that\,are\,written\,in\,such\,a$ have traveled. And don't worry-Road Rally organizers take local and seasonal traffic patterns into consideration when planning the event, so you never have to speed or drive recklessly to be competitive.

Types of Road Rallies

Road Rally types are all variations of the basic Time-Speed-Distance (TSD) Rally. At the start of a TSD Rally, competitors receive a book of route instructions (Route Sheet), written in Road Rally terminology. The Route Sheet describes the Road Rally course and gives the competitors the speeds they are expected to maintain along the route. (These speeds will be at or below the posted speed limit for the roads traveled.)

The event's organizers will have measured the course with a precision odometer prior to the event. Using this mileage and the average speeds, the organizers will have calculated the 'Perfect Time' that it should take participants to traverse the route. At locations along the course (called checkpoints or controls) that are unknown to the competitors, the teams are timed. (Sometimes these checkpoints are hidden!)

The participants' times are then compared to the 'Perfect Time' and points are added for every second that competitors are early or late at each checkpoint. In the end, the team with the lowest score wins. The challenge for competitors is to stay on time and on course. Most Rallies also permit a 'Time Allowance' for participants who may have gotten lost (or encountered a situation that caused losing time) to claim that time a roadworthy, registered, and insured vehicle. The driver must have a at the next checkpoint, so that they're not assessed a maximum penalty. valid driver's license; however, the navigator does not. Competitors under This is designed to prevent rallyists from speeding as a means of making up for lost time.

There are normally three types of Road Rally events:

Touring - A Touring Rally is a straightforward TSD Rally, where the route is described in the Route Sheet. All competitors have to do is to stay on course and on time.

Course - A Course (or Trap) Rally features additional rules and tricks (or traps) along the course that are designed to cause the teams to be late or early at the checkpoints. Competitors must not only follow the course as described in the Route Sheet, but must also keep in mind the rules so that they don't fall into the traps. Most local clubs such as ours do NOT run these types of Rallies. And, to be perfectly honest, they require rather masochistic Rallyists to want to do so (as well as a sadistic Rallymaster)!

GTA - A Game-Tour-Adventure (GTA) Rally is more loosely defined, and there are several subtypes. They may or may not include TSD segments with checkpoints. 'Shortest Distance' GTA Rallies involve competitors receiving a map and a series of questions to answer (like a scavenger hunt). They must obtain the answers to the questions while driving the fewest number of miles within a defined time period. 'Poker Runs' and 'Social' Rallies can also fall under the heading of GTA. GTA events can include Road Rally schools that involve instructional sessions and short TSD Touring or Course Rallies.

A GTA Rally with TSD segments is what our club runs, and our rallies way to make it almost impossible to get lost. (At least permanently...)

Along the way of a GTA Rally, Rallyists might be asked a question such as, "What does the number 46820 represent?" If they were paying close attention, they would note, as they drove by the local post office, that it is that town's Zip Code - backwards! And that is about as tricky as we get! In addition, there may be some highlights along the route where you are allocated a time stop (no penalties incurred) to take in some of the local flavor, such as, "Stop and watch your toes wiggle in the foot X-ray machine at Furdow's Shoe Store on Main Street!"

Often on Rallies, your Rallymaster(s) will be considerate of the needs you might have after having spent a couple of hours traversing the course's route, knowing that you probably had a few cups of coffee on the way to the event. So rest stops will also be scheduled, whereby one's needs can be discreetly met. If the need is so great that one must stop immediately, warnings are sometimes necessary and will be provided, especially when the contestants might not be familiar with the area. such as, "Do not take a brisk walk into the Belly Button Bayou National Mosquito and Tick Refuge in order to meet your needs! Please wait for the next checkpoint!"

What Do I Need?

As a minimum, a Road Rally team needs a driver, a navigator, and 18 years of age will need to have a minor waiver signed by both parents or legal guardians. Other basic equipment includes pens, pencils, and highlighters, and a watch that reads in seconds. A clipboard and fourfunction calculator may also prove helpful.

Road Rallying in the SCCA

For those of you who may be interested, the New England Region of the SCCA (NER/SCCA) has a very active Road Rally program. Classes of competition are defined in the NER Road Rally Regulations, available on the NER/SCCA's website, www.ner.org, or at the National SCCA home page, www.scca.com. All of these manuals can be downloaded as PDF files and are well worth having, especially for the many tips one can find.

SCCA events are generally more than 100 miles in length (the average is around 150) and take six or more hours to complete. (Most marque club events are shorter, averaging around 85 miles total.) Classes of competition are defined by the course measuring, time measuring, and calculation equipment you are allowed to use. Here in New England, the classes are:

Class A – No limits placed upon equipment.

 ${f Class \ S}$ — Competitors are limited to a stock odometer in its stock location. Calculation equipment is limited to a single-memory four-function calculator, standard slide rule devices, and/or tables and books.

Novice – The same equipment limitations as Class S, but neither driver nor navigator may have accumulated more than 50 SCCA championship points.


There's a good chance that, once you get your feet wet rallying with our club, the bug will bite you and you'll want to do more! The SCCA events are a good option (you don't have to be a member—it just costs a few bucks more to participate.)

Road Rallying in JANE

Keeping in mind that, while trying to make our Game-Tour-Adventure Rallies challenging and maintain an element of competition, we at the local club level have designed our routes and written our Route Sheet instructions in such a way that no one can get lost and not have fun! Almost all Rallies end at a restaurant or other social establishment. This is a big part of Rallying and is greatly enjoyed by all. Here, competitors trade stories of their adventures and enjoy each other's company while waiting for the awards to be handed out. And there is even a prize for last place—it's called the 'Broken Spoke Award'!

Some folks think they'd rather stay home and watch the NASCAR race on the telly, with the identically-shaped, pretty-colored cars going around and around in circles all day. Starting this season, all Rally Route Sheet Packets will contain a box of Skittles. Then, at rest stops along the way, participants can flush their identically-shaped, pretty-colored Skittles down the toilet and watch them go around and around. NASCAR isn't what's exciting—going out on a nice, warm Saturday or Sunday with your fellow Jaguar aficionados and participating in an event that has been put together for you, your wife, your mate, your special someone—that's what it's really all about!

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
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


