His caring about other people was clearly expressed in the way he listened - intensely tuned

Steve and I violated the supposedly strict Brigadoon code of not discussing religion or politics, and we had some great discussions with never an argument. In fact, of all the subjects we explored together, I don't remember XKs being one of them. The greatest thing about JANE and the XK list is all the great friends we find there - and Steve is one

Holly said Steve "loved life and had a great life." One look at his Donna and I usually saw Steve and Holly only once or twice a year at bright yellow with yellow-orange flames motorbike tells you that. And he added great love and joy to other people's lives along the way. His was not just a face in the crowd – especially with the handlebar mustache that was rivaled only by the handlebar on his motorbike - and he will not be forgotten.

As everyone in northern Mass and southern NH seems to know (the parking lots are always full!), Parker's Maple Barn Restaurant has wonderful breakfasts served all day. The term "wonderful" in this context means "eating large." It also means pancakes or waffles, together with bacon, sausage, and eggs, all with copious amounts of home-made maple syrup! Dick Horonieff, always the engineer, was observed to be calculating which one, a waffle or a pancake, would soak up the most maple syrup. This writer enjoyed the famous Parker's special maple walnut pancake breakfast, which included all of the above. I don't know about the waffle, but the huge pancake was found to be an excellent absorber of the desired elixir. Our XK120 FHC seemed to have shrunk in size as we squeezed ourselves into it to drive home after that huge amount of food.

We are looking forward to going back next year!







2010 JCNA Annual General Meeting - Great Time in Indianapolis

The last weekend in March Prebble and I attended time in four years (we missed Denver in 2009), and the Jaguar Association of Greater Indiana (JagIn) put on a fine show.

To start with, they selected a really interesting venue. The Crowne Plaza Hotel is built in and around the old Union Train Station in downtown Indianapolis. Indianapolis used to be a major rail center, and the present station was constructed in 1888. In its heyday, about 1900, there were 200 trains a day going through its vast expanse. Unfortunately, by the postwar years rail traffic was declining, and the station was used less and less. In 1970 the main station was turned into an urban shopping mall and open market. The construction in the late 1990s of a huge new urban mall nearby soon doomed the old station again to oblivion. It was rescued from the wrecker's ball by some forward-thinking developers, and it is now a major hotel and convention center. Most of the hotel facilities are built in what was the old train shed, where there once were about 20 elevated tracks with a concourse beneath to allow passengers to get around without crossing the tracks. Hotel rooms and meeting rooms now make up a three-story structure housed under the original shed, one story in the old concourse and two stories where the trains once rolled. The main station is used for meeting rooms and houses a number of small businesses and other organizations.

One interesting aspect of the hotel is that they kept 13 of the old pullman cars and they are now 26 cozy suites. Prebble and I stayed in one such suite -- the Winston Churchill -- and it was a nice novelty. Other interesting aspects of the hotel are the exposed steel structures from the old shed and the scattering of "Ghost People" throughout the hotel. The Ghost People are white-painted statues of typical train travelers from the station's heyday. You can see some of them in the photo album with this report on the website. Oh, and I need to point out that the hotel staff was terrific. Many of them remembered the Jaguar people from the Jaguar Challenge event in 2007 and welcomed Jaguar folks quite warmly.

The actual JCNA meeting on Saturday was held in the main station waiting room, which is now a huge and magnificent meeting facility complete with the original vaulted ceilings and huge, round, stained glass windows. Quite a unique meeting venue. You can see more in the photos.

Prebble and I arrived in Indianapolis early on Thursday morning in order to spend some time at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway Museum. Both of us are long-time Indy Car racing fans, and neither of us had seen the museum before, so it was a special treat -- well worth the time for the visit. Check out the photos on the JANE website.

On Thursday evening about 30 of the early arrivals went to dinner at a well-known Indy restaurant, Harry and Izzy's. The food was excellent, and Steve Kennedy treated on behalf of JCNA. Can't argue with that! We were told that Peyton Manning is part owner of the restaurant and that he and his wife had been there the previous evening. As a dyed-in-thewool Patriots fan, Prebble maintained that if he turned up while we were there she would boo him -- or worse. I did remind Prebble that Peyton had done one thing she wished for in 2010 -- lost the Super Bowl to New Orleans -- so she shouldn't be too hard on him!

Friday was a leisurely day for those not on the JCNA Board, with nothing planned until late afternoon. We took advantage of it for a little sightseeing and car gawking. Two magnificent Jaguars were on display at the hotel on Friday. The first was a genuine D-Type just getting home from the Amelia Island Concours. The second was an XJ13 Jaguar Le Mans race car. I'm not sure if the XJ13 is the original car or a replica, but it was rather impressive. Oh, and a new 2011 XJ was also on display.

Friday evening's activities were very enjoyable, and dinner was very the 2010 JCNA Annual General Meeting for the third much a motorhead's event. We all piled onto a bus for a 15-minute ride to the old Stutz Factory. Threatened with demolition, the old plant was rescued by local real estate developer Turner Woodard, himself a racer and car guy. He has extensively renovated the facility, and it is now home to his real estate development business and a myriad of art studios and small to medium businesses. It also houses Mr. Woodard's eclectic car collection. The featured marque is Stutz, of course, but there are also a number of other cars ranging from the 20s to the 90s. He appears to keep them all ready to drive whenever he pleases.

> Dinner was a catered affair held amid much of Woodard's car collection, so we got to have our cocktails while wandering among the cars, and eat under the fancy chandeliers that adorn his main storage facility. One interesting thing JagIn did was to give all attendees placemats consisting of large laminated photos of their own cars. I got an email from JagIn some time ago asking for a photo of our Jaguar, but not saying why, only that it was a special surprise -- and indeed it was! You can see a placemat of Elizabeth (our S1 Primrose E-Type) in one of the photos.

> Following the return bus trip from dinner, we were taken on a guided tour of the old station facilities by one of the hotel staff. There is a huge amount of space there, some of which is still awaiting development and use. We were shown everything from the old kitchen to a huge threebedroom apartment in the station that was once the station master's private residence, and perhaps the -- er -- highlight? of the tour, a glassed-in display of the original men's urinal, circa 1890. Now you don't get to see that every day!

> Saturday was a busy day for delegates, and Stacy Lancaster and Jim Sambold, JANE's delegates, were at the meeting table bright and early at 8 a.m. Prebble and I took a more leisurely approach and attended only the afternoon session as observers. Amazingly, the sessions actually broke up early -- a bit after 2 p.m. When Prebble and I were delegates in Houston 2007, the meetings were scheduled to end at 3 p.m. and ran on until after 5!

> The last thing on the agenda for the weekend was the annual Awards Banquet, and it was a special treat for Prebble, and for me as well -- Prebble received the Karen Miller Award for best JCNA Newsletter Editor for 2009, and it was richly deserved. Though an experienced writer and editor, when Prebble took over the Coventry Cat from Dave Pratt about two years ago, she had no idea how to use contemporary publishing software (she uses Adobe InDesign), and she had never undertaken any regular publication before. The results speak for themselves -- the Coventry Cat stands out, and each issue seems to be better than the last.

> And the award also belongs to all JANE members who send material to Prebble. In accepting the award, Prebble made a point of thanking all the JANE members for their contributions. Without such abundant material, the Cat could not be the outstanding newsletter that it is. Prebble said that one of the main challenges facing her predecessors and some of the other newsletter editors with whom she has talked is the lack of contributed material. Not so with JANE members! Prebble has increased the number of pages to 24 each month, and always has more material than she can use. She thanked all JANE contributors for helping her win this gratifying award.

> Thanks also go to our daughter Kim. Kim is Production Manager for the Stowe Reporter in Vermont. She uses InDesign regularly in her work and was an enormous help to Prebble in getting up the learning curve.

> Well, that's about it except for the silent auction, where I got carried away. I scored a beautiful big poster of a C-Type that is destined to be

framed and hung in my newly redone shop, a Jaguar wall clock headed for the same destination, a nearly complete original Series 3 XJ6 tool kit (maybe I need to find a car to go with it), and a large-format model (about 9 inches long) of Steve McQueen's XKSS. I'm not sure yet where that will go. Prebble said "you spent how much?"

All in all it was a terrific weekend with lots of car talk, some new friends, and smooth travel. A closing word on the travel. We opted for non-stop flights from Logan, and they went off perfectly, in stark contrast to our return trip from the Pittsburgh AGM in 2008. Coming home from Pittsburgh we were routed through Detriot, but missed that connection. We were then rerouted through Laguardia, but missed that connection also. We ended up renting a car and driving from Laguardia, arriving home about 3 a.m. -- total travel time of over 12 hours -- but that's another story.

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The Saga of Louie - #67 XK-120 Alloy By Aldo Cipriano



The roadster was intended to be an expedited platform to showcase Jaguar's new XK motor, designed for installation in future Jaguar saloons, which were expected to resurge Sir William Lyons's company in the postwar era in the UK, a time when the war survival and noble valiant effort left Great Britain the victor, but cash strapped. The open two-seater was called the XK Super Sport and the "XK Allie," and was virtually a hand-built sports roadster with aluminum alloy panels laid over ash wood framing.

Only about 242 alloys were constructed, approximately 17 being left-hand drive. During the middle of the winter 2008 I was approached by the Slarskey family in Ayer, MA, to help evaluate a "1949 Jaguar" in the family's ownership since 1961. The referral for assistance came from our good friends at Lee Jaguar in Wellesley.

Seeking assistance, I called upon veteran club regular Rod Gilbert to help evaluate this "1949 Jaguar," which was then described as an XK-120 alloy! Upon arrival in Ayer the plastic tarps were removed, and with a bonnet-to-boot perusal, I quickly came to appreciate what all this Jaguar loyalty and respect was about. This OTS was beyond a mere barn find. Secured away 20-odd years ago, this was a virtually all original XK-120 alloy constructed at the "Works" on December 29, 1949, and shipped from Coventry on January 10, 1950. Destination: Hoffman New York, the historic Jaguar East Coast distributor.

The data plate designated the OTS as #6700067, with two original style "hoods," and repainted in a shade of British Racing Green with burgundy biscuit interior. The roadster was still resplendent in its solid originality of parts and matching numbers.

What I learned from this brief trip and inspection was something often mentioned in historical publications as to this classic Jaguar with perfectly fitted ash wood framing and alloy panels, and substructure components with unique, but classic design. I realized that the designers and workmen who created these cars must have gotten their expertise from the British aircraft industry in the mid-1930s to mid-1940s.

The family calls #67 "Louie," in honor of their patriarch, Louis Slarskey, a popular businessman in the Ayer area who favored Buicks but just loved the look of the 1949 XK-120. Louie Slarskey was just our club's kind of guy.

Our deep appreciation to Stu Forer, Rod Gilbert, and Dave Randall for advice on value and finding a bonafide purchaser, and to our beloved Sir Harry Parkinson of Nashua for the Paul Skilliter research while he was in Great Britain. A range of value was determined and a reputable purchaser found. During Louie's authentication and evaluation process (five months total) many fine and distinguished prospective buyers stepped forward to inquire about #67, a true testament to the Alloy's lineage as a vintage Jaguar.

Rod Gilbert secured the Jaguar Daimler Heritage Trust Certificate from Jaguar Heritage in Mahwah, NJ, and Sir Harry secured one on his last trip to Coventry, having exclusive access to the manufacturer's archives and personnel. All numbers and the build date were verified for Sheila Slarskey, Louis's older daughter, and most importantly, the colors as #67 Louie left the Jaguar Works: silver, with biscuit and red piping interior. We can all visualize these classic colors as #67 entered New York in the year 1950.

Number 67 will be restored by a top East Coast restorer, and I will follow its return to glory in future articles. I am also researching the missing years of ownership between 1950 and 1961.

The best treat of all? The new owner also has a right-hand drive 1950 Alloy and enjoys Concours events. I have personally invited him and the Slarskey family to a future JANE Concours.
