Happy New Year to all! Thanks to everyone's efforts, JANE continues to grow, and we ended 2014 with a total of 305 member families, up from 299 at the end of 2013! The 305 total includes 37 new members and 20 former members who rejoined. So, overall we lost 51 members who started 2014 with JANE (299 - 51 + 57 = 305).

JCNA hasn't released the 2014 club numbers yet, but I'm confident that JANE will still be one of the largest clubs (if not THE largest AGAIN) in North America. Being #1 AGAIN would make for good "bragging rights" for JANE at the AGM! But even with this good news, everyone

needs to be a "recruiter" in 2015. We always lose a few members and gain a few members – but if we want the club to continue to grow, we need to make sure the gains exceed the losses! I'd like to see our numbers reach at least 325 by the end of 2015. I hope everyone has a few JANE brochures to hand out to prospective members – if not, I'll be happy to provide some to you. You'll also find a 2015 new member application in this issue that you can print and hand out – keep some on hand!

We're off to a great start for 2015, thanks to the 196 members/families who renewed by December 31st. That's the good news – the not-so-good news is that 109 members/families have NOT renewed for 2015. Of those 109, I know of 5 who have indicated they will leave JANE for various reasons – but that leaves 104 who still need to renew! If you're among those, please don't wait – renew before the end of January so you won't miss out on the fun and can also be counted on the 2015 roster for the JCNA AGM. You'll find a renewal form in this issue.

Sometime in February I'll be mailing letters to everyone who has not renewed. We'll ask WHY they haven't renewed and will use their feedback to address any identified issues and to improve the overall JANE membership experience.

As usual, one lucky member or family who renewed their membership before the end of December will receive a free basic membership (\$60) for 2015 at a drawing to be held at the January JANE social meeting. Club officers (2015), Associate Members, Life Members, and new or rejoining members whose membership already extends through 2015 are not eligible for the drawing, but that leaves a total of 166 members/families who will be entered in the drawing. 

Happy New Year!

I thought I'd start the year off with a few words, since I was so guiet in 2014. And what better subject than New Year's resolutions.

My observation of resolutions is that most people resolve to either not do something because it is bad, or do something that will offset something bad. The top resolutions are usually to go on a diet, exercise, or quit a bad habit. And it is this negative aspect of resolutions that inevitably ends in failure. How many people do you know who've resolved to do something

in those three generalized categories and stuck with it through the whole year? A small percentage, I'm sure. So why not resolve in 2015 to make more positive resolutions? They would be easier to keep. And if you're organized and like to plan out your days, weeks, and months, then positive resolutions would fit nicely into your itinerary. Let me explain.

Resolve to appreciate art times this year, the blank being the number of times you would resolve to do this. This is a broad category, but it's exactly what makes it positive. Pick an easy amount of time - say, once a month - and figure out how to enlighten yourself artistically. Maybe you'll start reading a book. The next month you might drop by an art gallery. If you enjoy cooking you might pick a recipe with a particular ingredient you've never tried, such as an unusual vegetable or meat. And interestingly, our tastes change over time, so what was nasty tasting as a child may now be delicious.

Resolve to go to a new place. Again, this is a broad category which you can tweak for the best bang for your buck. Many of you travel at least once a year anyway, and perhaps you choose a new destination every time. If so, good for you, but that won't count for your resolution! One good way to fulfill this resolution is to take the town, state, and/or region you live in and visit a place within that area you've never been before. It's sometimes called a "stay-cation."

I'm a good example of someone who doesn't even know her own backyard. I've lived in the same town for 22 years and never visited Willowbrook Living History Center (http://www.willowbrookmuseum.org/), which is





15 minutes from my house. I know about it, it has one of the last surviving, working steam-powered carousels. But it wasn't until I joined a re-enacting group that I actually visited the center. What an amazing place! I won't take up space with details, suffice to say that you needn't travel hundreds or thousands of miles to enjoy a new place. And with the convenience of the Internet you just might find an interesting local place to take a day trip.

Resolve to do something Jaguar. Saving the best for last! Actually I could go on, but you most likely got the idea if you've read this far. For this final resolution, plan to do something with or about Jaguar. Again, this could be monthly or quarterly or even just once. If you plan to attend the 2015 JCNA Annual General Meeting (AGM), for example, that would be just one occasion. But maybe you want to attend more JANE meetings or more JANE events. There's normally something going on every month, so a regular peek at the JANE website or calendar in the newsletter will fulfill this resolution. If location is a factor and you can't attend meetings, there are other things Jaguar you could do. Read a book about Jaguar, watch a movie with Jaguar cars in it, or while you are resolving to go to a new place, go in your Jag. And of course take photos and send them to me with a little story so I can share with JANE members in the *Coventry Cat*. Oh look, that takes care of three resolutions in one shot!

Enjoy 2015, resolve to do something new and fun, and for goodness sake do it in a Jag!



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More Driver Ed at Jaguar School – Dave Goes To Level Two!

Now Where Were We?

Alert readers of the *Coventry Cat* may recall that last summer I wrote about attending Level One of Jaguar's High Performance Driving Academy. I mentioned then that I had signed up for Levels Two and Three, just for the sake of science. Well, I completed both of those courses in early October and feel they merit your attention.

Level One, if you recall, was five hours of track instruction with a bit of class at the beginning, held at the Monticello Motor Club. This instruction is intended for adult drivers (that'd be us) who mostly have little or no experience with driving, er, fast (which is one of the things Jaguar cars are quite capable of, as we've all noticed). Good of Jaguar to help us out here.

Level One included a classroom session, an autocross exercise, a 180°-turn exercise, an array of lead-follow exercises on Monticello's main track (3.6 miles, 18 turns) and some exposure to enthusiastic hot laps by the faculty. (They strap you in the passenger seat, *really tight*, and then take off at what they think of as *full bore*, overjoyed that they *finally* no longer have to *go so friggin*' slow. *Aieeeeee!*, as my Japanese in-laws sometimes have said.) A busy, full afternoon, and they actually brought us along quite quickly, so that by the end of the day we had progressed in our car control skills by a lot. We knew PLENTY more than we had when the afternoon started.

On To Level Two

Level Two is a full-day affair (about nine hours, all told). You'd think that Level Two would start up where Level One left off, but you'd be wrong. Level Two goes right back to the beginning, for the same set of adult drivers with little experience with fast (as well as some accumulated rust since partaking of Level One). The same exercises are presented, approximately the same way. The difference is that expectations are a little higher and the exercises get repeated over and over, so we began to really build up a fund of experience in car control. And, as Tom Brady (you know who he is, right?) has pointed out repeatedly, you can never get enough reps.

The Zen of Lead-Follow

After the autocross, the handling oval, and the skid-pad (now a figure 8, just like mid-section of the JCNA slalom course), we went to work on lead-follow exercises, five or six laps (18-21 miles) per session, switching cars and instructors for every session. This is *the* key instructional component for this sort of training and it is marvelously effective. You and two others follow the instructor in a sort of "monkey-see, monkey-do"



progression of cars, with the instructor in the front car guiding you via radio instructions all the time – the radio chatter becomes a sort of pleasant, comforting on-going traffic advisory: "Eeeasy on the brakes, now go right and, oops, a quick left through the corkscrew and right, use the curb a little – very nice, very nice – roll on the throttle – good, good – more to the left– now watch for the yellow pylon – excellent – Dave, you're a little wide at the apex – tighten it up, please – verry good . . . " You learn where to place the car, where to look, where to brake, where and why the car "feels funny," and where and how much to accelerate. Every session goes a little faster, and little by little the track comes together for you. Toward the end of the afternoon we're beginning to feel pretty good about this – the cars mostly go where we ask them to and it *feels* like we've got some reasonable control of what's happening. What used to seem fast now seems fairly leisurely, and turns that were mere bends in a straight road earlier now begin to really occupy our attention and challenge us as *turns*.

Interestingly, there's little sense of how powerful these cars are (510-550 horsepower) or how big they are (for the record, we were



driving XJRs, XKRs, XFRs, and F-Type R coupes – all pretty prodigious and luxy street cars – their general capability for these sessions is a great credit to Jaguar). We left the traction control on, of course, and I, for one, spent a fair amount of time trying to figure out how to keep it from reducing engine power and interfering with my progress as I exited from some of the tighter turns watching the instructor disappear off into the distance. Ah, the joys of a light foot on the throttle!

It was all progressive, smooth, safe, and increasingly fast. And, Lordy, did we learn!

I won't bore you with how much better I got during this Level Two session (aside from noting I wuz awesome, simply awesome). Instead, I'd like to share with you two of the highlights at the end of the day for me.

The Scandinavian Flick as a Way of Life – Morgan Kavanaugh gives me a hot hot lap

Most of the instructors come from racing backgrounds, but some have extensive instructor backgrounds as well. I drew Morgan Kavanaugh for my so-called hot lap, and Morgan has been an instructor and developer of curriculum at the legendary Bridgestone Winter Driving School for a long time (buy me a scotch and ask me about my adventures there, if you really want to hear some stories sometime). Morgan *loves* driving on ice, and he *really, really* loves to drive a car when it is going sideways (he says he started doing this when he was about eight and he's never been able to stop doing it ever since!). The best way to do this is by using a maneuver called the Scandinavian Flick to get the slides going. Morgan would finesse these into long, lurid, sideways drifts, initiated as he would flick the car hard toward the outside of the road (the Scandinavian part of it) and then pitch it sideways pointing in toward the approach to each corner, letting the car snap back as

we passed the apex into a fresh sideways drift the other direction for the next turn. So we went around the track sideways, all eighteen turns, looking at each approaching turn through the side windows, Morgan very rapidly counter-steering and correcting the steering wheel with hands that were a blur, to maintain the slide right to the apex of each turn, where the car would then rotate and begin its next sideways slide toward the next turn, rear end held out with throttle and lots of smoky rear wheel-spin. And, weird as it sounds, we were going just about as fast as all the more tidy, civilized instructor-types on their hot laps. The only boring parts were the straights, where we just went, you guessed it, straight. Boring.

This is how the rally guys do it, and when you see them on TV it looks immensely graceful – long, slowly rotating slides that end up with the car pointing in just the right direction, rooster-tails of snow or gravel spraying off all four wheels as the car finally gets traction and exits *post-haste* from the turn through the next poor suffering village. Beautiful and totally awesome (except for the villagers). From inside the car, though, it is really different – not particularly graceful. It doesn't feel fast so much as extremely busy while you are frantically peering sideways through the driver's door window at the approaching right-hander and then quickly snapping eyes right to look through the passenger-side window for the ensuing left-hander, also snapping the steering wheel back and forth, modulating the throttle and car direction in a continuous, ongoing tight-rope tap dance of automotive inertia, velocity, and friction. Keeps ya busy.

So, this is not really for street use. But, if you learn how to do it, you can control virtually any car virtually anywhere. And, if you've taken your motion-sickness pills, it really is an awful lot of fun. Beats a roller-coaster all hollow.

A Master Class with Roberto Guerrero

However, for me the high point of the day was a one-on-one session with Roberto Guerrero. Roberto has had an illustrious career in Formula 1, Indy cars, and in off-road racing. He is an immensely talented and experienced driver. He is also the smoothest, most graceful driver I have ever encountered.





Think of it this way: you are an enthusiastic amateur cellist, you attend a cello-playing workshop, and all of a sudden you find yourself in a private room with Yo Yo Ma for a master class, working on one of J. S. Bach's Unaccompanied Cello Suites, say, the Prelude from Suite #2. Yo Yo says, "Now, David, listen to me play this, all the way through. Then I want you to play it, exactly as I did." He plays. Whoooooa, was *that* beautiful, or what? He then hands over his \$2.5 million 1733 Montagnana cello to you, and asks you to play. Gulp!

This is an experience that is just about as good as it ever gets, especially for a rank amateur like me. Really especially when he says, during one of the episodes in that gorgeous Prelude, "Lovely line there, David. Just lovely."

I have no idea if Roberto drove fast when he showed

me the way around Monticello. He must have, because we seemed to be back at start/finish in about five or six seconds. Or else, time had just simply stopped for me. But what it was, was a transcendental experience, the smoothest and most graceful driving at speed I've ever experienced. I had no idea cars could do this! When I grow up, I wanna be able to drive like him!



Man, it was beautiful.

This is why we mess around with cars.


And that was Level Two.



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
