Nearing completion, with only carburetors, manifold, and a few other things to go for completion, Bruce claims that he will not be building the car for the engine, but I suspect that he may go one step further with at least a scale chassis. This engine is definitely a work of art and deserves to be in a museum when it is finished.

There are only two more events before the end of the year, our November monthly meeting on Wednesday the 18th (a week earlier than usual because of Thanksgiving the following week) and our Holiday Party on Sunday, December 6th. The Holiday Party is always a great time for us to close out the year with fun and fellowship, and this year's will be no different. Jim and Crin Coull have made all the necessary arrangements for us to be at the Vesper Country Club once again. The Holiday Party will also include our Annual General Meeting and provide you with the opportunity as a club member to vote on the slate of officers for 2016, so make sure that you go to the website and register early. #### Quebec City (and more)!

We are excited to announce that JANE will be making a trip to Quebec City at the beginning of June! The city is designated as a UNESCO World Heritage Site and is the only walled city north of Mexico.

This event will have two parts. The first part is the "core trip," four days in length. We arrive in Quebec City on Thursday afternoon, June 2, and depart on Sunday, June 5. The second part of the event is an additional day in Quebec City for those who can stay a bit longer.

We have booked a block of rooms at a great hotel in the center of the old city. Ed Avis and Mark Lenci have visited the Hotel Clarendon (a private hotel – nothing to do with the U.S. Clarendon hotel chain) and found it and its staff simply delightful. They will make our visit something to remember. The hotel is offering a corporate room and

executive room to club members for this event. There is a 5% discount for early booking (before December 1). The current exchange rate makes the cost of these rooms very attractive.

#### **Detailed Itinerary**

#### June 2 (Thursday): Travel to Quebec City

- Route Option 1 Rally from Waterville, Maine (highly recommended for those in eastern Massachusetts, New Hampshire, and Maine):
  - Mark and Ed strongly recommend this option for those who can depart from Maine. The drive is beautiful and fun for Jaguars. Mark and Ed have several activities planned along the drive, including lunch. The drive will go north from Waterville on US 201 and on into Canada.
  - We will depart from Waterville at 9 AM.
  - For those who wish to drive up to Waterville the night before, we will reserve a block of rooms at the Hampton Inn in Waterville. For those in Massachusetts, this nicely divides the trip to Quebec City into two approximately five-hour drives.

#### 5 to 7 PM – JANE welcome reception

- The reception will be in the Hotel Clarendon lounge and bar, reserved for our private use.
- Hors d'oeuvres will be served.
- A "welcome to Quebec City" beverage coupon will be provided (red or white wine, soft drinks, gin, whisky, or beer)!
- Additional beverages can be purchased at the bar.

#### June 3 (Friday) - Old Quebec City

- This day is dedicated primarily to exploring the old city of Quebec.
- We will provide a general outline for an informal walking visit to explore the old city. Members can participate in any portions that they wish or explore on their own.
- There are boundless choices of places to dine for dinner. Event participants may make individual or small group arrangements.

#### June 4 (Saturday) – Fire up the Jaguars for a trip to Montmorency Waterfall and Ile d'Orleans

- We will depart bright and early (8 AM) from the hotel for a 15-minute drive to the base of the Montmorency Waterfall on the St Lawrence River. Those desiring to get a view from the top can take a cable car up. Will Ed do the zip line across the gorge at the face of the waterfall we'll see!
- From the falls we will drive over the bridge to lle d'Orleans and circle the island clockwise, stopping to visit the following:
  - Wine tasting at Vignoble Domaine de la source a Marguerite. This winery has wines made from their own apples, pears, and grapes, including the unique Quebec ice wine. The ice wine is made from apples left on the trees until the winter temperature reaches -5 F. One-hundred frozen apples are needed to make a single .5L bottle of this delightful wine.
  - Lookout tower at the eastern end of the island with a dramatic view of the St Lawrence River, Ile d'Orleans, and the mountainous shores of Quebec.
  - Lunch at Le Moulin de St Laurent Restaurant (an old grist mill)
  - Chocolate factory

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- Wine tasting at Vignoble Ste-Petronille
- Return to the hotel about 5 PM
- 6 PM (about) Cocktail social and four-course dinner in a private room at the Hotel Clarendon.
  - Cash bar available.

#### June 5 (Sunday) - Departure or an additional day

- Those who cannot stay another day may depart at any time.
- We will organize a private two-hour walking tour of the old city in the morning for those who desire to remain an
  additional day. The particular guide we have arranged has received rave reviews. This will be a small group of
  ten people maximum. If more people desire to participate, we will organize a second tour.
- We have a list of other suggested activities for the afternoon. Additionally, the hotel concierge seems eager to advise and help arrange any other type of activity members may be interested in.

#### June 6 (Monday) - Departure day

• Depart in the morning as desired.



#### Event Reports

#### **JANE Lobster Tour**

Twenty-nine JANE members and guests went on a tour of the New Hampshire and southern Maine Seacoast on October 11th, a beautiful sunny, mild day. The route started at our meeting point, the Portsmouth, New Hampshire, traffic circle liquor store, a convenient location for all needs, including bathroom facilities and an easy-to-find parking lot for our Jags. The tour was a 40-mile route of coastal and back roads.

The tour traversed along the northern New Hampshire Atlantic coastline in Rye, passing Odiorne State Park, Wallis Sands State Beach, and stopping at Rye Harbor State Park overlooking Rye Harbor. We had the opportunity to see the harbor at high tide, and yes, the tour guides lucked out on that one, since it's so much more scenic than at low tide. We also saw the John Smith Memorial, for the first European to map and name New England, in 1614, the same John Smith who founded Jamestown in 1607. For Nat. Geo. Wicked Tuna buffs, the ship Pinwheel is based in Rye Harbor. Trevor was not there to greet us.

We then followed the coastal route along the ocean past Jenness State Beach, where surfers are often seen year round, and there are





beautiful homes, many built with fantastic views of the ocean and with classic designs from a century ago. Next we passed by Fuller Gardens (a stop for another tour), and stopped at North Hampton State Beach, where we reversed our course for photographs with the ocean in the background at the Little Boars Head area of North Hampton. Thanks to Jim Sambold, who offered to stay behind to photograph our Jags at this scenic overlook. The course then wandered inland, passing Runnymede Farm, the home of Dancer's Image, winner of the 1968 Kentucky Derby. The course traversed through the back roads of Rye, more horse farms, Brit Brats, and progressed toward New Castle.

Once in New Castle, we passed Wentworth by the Sea, a classic Marriott hotel built in 1874 and recently updated. Of course there is a classic marina and golf course on the grounds as well. New Castle is an old fishermen's community with centuries-

old homes lining the winding road.



We wound our way into the oldest parts of Portsmouth for more fishermen homes and narrow streets, Prescott Park, and proceeding toward the Memorial Bridge. Here part of our tour

Off to Maine through Kittery, by the Naval Shipyard and nearby, Chauncey Creek Lobster Pound, which was our original lunch stop, but unfortunately was booked for the day. The tour then passed by more breathtaking, beautiful homes along the coastal route and up toward York, passing by the Stage Neck Inn (a great restaurant for another trip), and yes, of course more ocean front views! Our route then wound by York Beach and up toward the Nubble Lighthouse. Yes, more beautiful homes along the ocean by the lighthouse, all leading the tour group to the end of our tour at Fox's Lobster House. The restaurant provided ocean views for all,

#### How the Early Bird Caught the Worm

The girl at the British Airways check-in was surprised. "But sir, this ticket is for a flight tomorrow, not today. You're here a day early." Our premature traveler was none other than Bill Tracy, whose adventure with a C-Type I chronicled in a previous article for these pages. And Bill was no less amazed than she was. How could he have done that? Bill had spent the previous week or so traveling around the UK visiting suppliers and customers for his vintage Jaguar parts business. Somehow, inexplicably, he had lost track of time and arrived at Heathrow a full day early! What to do now? There must be some way to do something productive with an extra 24 hours. But what?

Then Bill thought of Adrian Hamilton, son of Duncan Hamilton (famous Jaguar driver in the 1950s and winner at Le Mans), who had a shop in Bagshot, England, where he sold cars. And Bagshot was only about 15 miles from Heathrow. A good way to spend that bonus time would be to check out Adrian's shop and see what interesting cars he had for sale. So Bill headed for Bagshot in a rental car to see what new automotive adventure might await.

That new adventure turned out to be Lightweight E-Type registration number 5114WK. This car was one of three that Briggs Cunningham raced at Le Mans in 1963. It was DNF in that race, though its bonnet did finish the race on one of the other Lightweights! It was subsequently crashed heavily at Silverstone, then beautifully restored to its original condition. When Bill arrived at Adrian's it was there, and for sale! Not only was it for sale, but Adrian suggested that since it was originally owned and raced by an American, Briggs Cunningham, it should go back to America! Bill couldn't resist that argument and bought it on the spot! Part of the deal was that Adrian would arrange for air shipment to New York and

make arrangements for a broker to get it through customs. So it turned out that being early at Heathrow had paid off in a way that Bill had never expected!

About a couple weeks after making his way back to his home in Virginia the call from the broker came. "Mr Tracy, your car is ready for pickup at Kennedy Airport." After a quick trip to the airport and back, 5114WK was safely in his driveway and Bill was the happy owner of a very unique Jaguar ... only 12 ever built (up until recently!). For those readers unfamiliar with the Lightweights, it had some very interesting features. Even the engine block was aluminum to save weight. Jaguar recommended that it be raced with the hardtop in place to help stiffen the aluminum body structure. It had an oil cooler for the rear differential driven by an SU fuel pump, and the oil radiator can be seen in the accompanying photo under the tail of the car. That small triangular piece just behind the front wheels, which can be seen in the photos, is to compensate for the curve of the body and to comply with Le Mans rules that required a specified portion of the perimeter of the wheel to be covered. And it had Lucas fuel injection rather than the triple Webers usually fitted to Jaguar race cars.

Even though the car had been nicely restored, Bill wasn't satisfied with the paint, so he decided to strip it down and repaint it himself. But this time it wouldn't be red! He wanted to make sure it was as close to original livery as possible. He didn't think that the white was a problem, but the blue stripe was. Exactly what shade of blue should it be? He thought that the best way to find out was to talk to the original owner, Briggs Cunningham. But the call to Briggs was unproductive. Briggs didn't know of any specific paint code, so Bill had to wing it. Since he couldn't get any paint data, Bill tried another subject. He knew that the Le Mans

winning XKC051, sans bodywork, was in the Cunningham museum. Since he knew how to get a new body built in the UK, he proposed a trade, the 5114WK for Briggs's XKC051. But Briggs rejected that proposal.

With the repaint complete, the fun began. Bill took the car to local shows, then decided to do some racing. He showed the car at Road Atlanta and raced it there. He also raced it at Moroso, near Palm Beach. Walter Hill was also at Moroso with his Lightweight CUT7, and Bill had the opportunity to race him with 5114WK. But it wasn't an even match. Bill's car was built for Le Mans, and in order to save weight it didn't have a brake servo. Hill's CUT7 did, so he could go deeper into the turns. Bill could keep up with him on the straights, but lost in the turns.

After a couple of years of showing and racing, Bill's Lightweight E suffered the same fate as his C-Type ... time to sell to help fund Bill's retirement in sunny Florida. He took it to an auction in Auburn, Indiana, and although it didn't sell in the auction it was an after-auction sale. Time now to move on to the next automotive adventure!




